MARCH 8th, INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

INTRODUCTION: March 8, 1911: The past that built the present

It was 1911 when the International Working Women's Day was first celebrated, with its



demands for the the right to vote, the right to work and for non-discrimination at work. The choice of March 8th can be explained by the events that occurred on the same date in 1908. 146 women, workers of the Cotton textile factory in New York burned to death. The fire was caused by the incendiary bombs thrown at them in response to their refusal to discontinue their protest against the low wages and the infamous conditions of work that they suffered.

In Mexico, this day was commemorated for the first time in 1932, through the Women's Action Orienting League that had Elvia Carrillo Puerto as Secretary General. She, with the support of Frida Kahlo and other women, managed to bring together female workers in the country to celebrate this day. It was Frida who claimed the right to vote for women.

In 1975, the United Nations Organization recognized this day as a worldwide celebration with the First World Conference of Women in Mexico. From that date on it has been a special day for all the women of the world.

Today we can ask what is the point of celebrating International Women's Day? It is more than a celebration of womanhood

- it is an invitation or challenge to reflect on the situation

of invisibility, oppression, poverty of many women in our world and to ask 'What can we, as Marists, do to help change this situation?

- * acknowledge the right to critical reflection of our tradition and approach biblical studies from gender perspectives?
- Creatively use readings from the lectionary and the liturgy and incorporate an inclusive language into our speech?
- work towards sustainable development for all without degrading the planet?
- Promote an affective-sexual education with a broad vision that encourages real encounter, deep love and mutual pleasure?
- recognise the political dimension of the private sphere?
- hold sacred the historical memory of invisible and silenced women?
- work for a change in human relations based on equality, respect and democracy?
- create women's networks in dialogue with other movements and groups in defence of justice?



In this new millennium, we must ask ourselves: 'What can I do today for women in order to be a witness of the Gospel of Jesus? What can we do together?
